

Professor Luis Hinojosa holds the Chair of International Law and International Relations at Granada University, where he served as Director of the Department of Public International Law (2009-2017) and as Director of the European Documentation Centre (1999-2009). He is currently a Convener of the Unit of Excellence *Digital Society: Security and Protection of Rights* at Granada University and the lead researcher in a national research project on *The international legal and political challenges of disinformation and artificial intelligence*. He has also been member of the Board of ESIL (European Society of International Law) (2012-2020) and was its President between 2017 and 2019. Previously, he served as Convener of the ESIL International Economic Law Interest Group (2010-2013). Between 2008-2011 he held the position of Coordinator of Social and Legal Sciences of AGAE (Andalusian Agency of Evaluation), the independent scientific body in charge of the evaluation of research of Andalusian universities. Since 2023, Prof. Hinojosa has been appointed as Spanish representative in the FIDE (Fédération Internationale pour le Droit Européen) Steering Committee.

Professor Hinojosa Martínez has worked as international consultant for the Council of Europe and has collaborated with public administrations in various projects, and as an advisor to members of the European Parliament. He has also collaborated with Think Tanks such as the Real Instituto Elcano, and has worked as attorney in the law firm Van Bael & Bellis (Brussels/Geneva/London).

In recent years, Prof Hinojosa's research has focused on two main areas: the geostrategic confrontation between democracies that defend the rule of law and autocracies, and the legal impact of digitalization. His teaching and research have focused on civil and social human rights, rule of law, international economic law, European Union law, and international terrorism. In European law, his work has extensively covered the protection of human rights, the European social model, sanctions, the regulation of the European Single Market, particularly the free movement of capital, integration of financial markets, crypto-assets, and the digital euro. He has also addressed European law application by national judges, EU competencies, Brexit, European and international tax law, and EU external economic relations. Within international law, his research spans the legal and economic aspects of terrorism and their implications for human rights, sovereignty, globalization, transparency of international institutions, and international economic law.

He has written or edited numerous books, including *European Union, Democratic Principles and International Order* (2024), *Enhancing the Rule of Law in the European*

*Union's External Action* (2023), *Justice, Trade, Security and Individual Freedoms in the Digital Society* (2021), *The Regulation of International Markets and the Erosion of the European Social and Political Model* (2019), *The European Banking Union* (2015), *International Economic Law* (2010, 2022), *International Legal Instruments Against the Financing of Terrorism* (2008), and *Fair Trade and Social Rights* (2002).

Professor Hinojosa is also a member of the Executive Board of AEDEUR (Spanish Association for the Study of European Law), a member of SIEL (Society of International Economic Law), and a member of AEPDIRI (Spanish Association of Professors of International Law and International Relations), where he previously served on its Executive Board. He is a member of the Scientific Committee of *Ordine internazionale e diritti umani*, the Advisory Board of the *Revista de Derecho Comunitario Europeo*, and a former member of the Editorial Board of the *European Journal of International Law* and of the Editorial Board of the *Revista Española de Derecho Internacional*. Professor Hinojosa is also a reviewer for a large number of Spanish and foreign scientific journals.

Professor Hinojosa has participated in 14 competitive research projects, in five of these as lead researcher, involving many prestigious researchers from different countries. Currently, he is also principal investigator of the consolidated research group of the Junta de Andalucía 'International and European Legal Studies'. In addition, he has been awarded 5 consecutive six-year research periods by the National Commission for the Evaluation of Research Activity (CNEAI). In addition, Professor Hinojosa is a member of the Economic and Legal Sciences Commission of Unibasq (the Basque accreditation agency), of the Legal Commission of AQU (the Catalan accreditation agency) and an evaluator of ANEP (Agencia Nacional de Evaluación y Prospectiva).

Professor Hinojosa has given conferences and taught courses in Spanish, French and English in Universities and Institutions in the USA, Latin America, North Africa, Europe and Asia. He has been invited to speak at Conferences organized in the Court of Justice of the European Union, the European Court of Human Rights and the International Court of Justice. He has been a Visiting Scholar at Stetson School of Law, University of Florida (2007), The University of California, Berkeley (2023 and 2010) and the European University Institute, Florence (2024).
